

# Mount Fuji Eruption Evacuation Map

## For all climbers and visitors

This map is for use by visitors to Mount Fuji for evacuation and other assistance in the event of a sudden eruption. The Road Map shows ways to escape on foot and is covered with pink dots that serve as a guide to current location and direction of evacuation. The Evacuation Scenario Map displays ten typical eruption patterns as well as instructions for immediate evacuation for each one. Please note that these cases are based off of past eruptions and are not guaranteed to be exact predictors of future situations.

## Description of Maps and Symbols


This Road Map shows topography (valleys and ravines) and routes for evacuation on foot, including connection points that serve as reference for orientation. Note that the map does not display some small pedestrian paths and other minor landmarks.

- Fuji Subaru Line (SB)
- Numbers in names of connection points on the Fuji Subaru Line indicate distances in kilometers from the Fifth Station parking lot.
- Minamifuji Evergreen Line
- Fuji-Azami Line (FA)
- Fuji Skyline (FS)
- Mountain trails
- Trails indicated by four colors
- Yoshida Trail (YO)
- Fujinomiya Trail (F)
- Gotemba Trail (G)
- Subashiri Trail (S)
- Pedestrian path
- Paths accessible by foot
- Forest road
- These are mainly used for forestry and may not be accessible to regular vehicles.
- National, prefectural, or major municipal road
- Highway
- Prefectural border
- Connecting point
- Numbers of points shown on trail correspond to signs posted at those locations. Points without signs are not shown on the map.
- 1.0km
- Distance between connecting points (km)
- Gate (forest and pedestrian roads)
- Parking lot
- Toll area
- Potential crater formation area
- Area where craters could appear in the event of an eruption


### Note on Applicable Dates and Evacuation Routes

## When Climbing

- 1 Stay regularly updated on volcanic activity reports.
- 2 Submit a Climbing Plan.
- 3 Keep your phone on in order to receive emergency notifications\* and other messages.
- 4 Wear or carry a helmet and other safety equipment.



\*Emergency notifications: Service offered by cellphone providers that, in the event of a weather warning by the Japan Meteorological Agency, sends a message to users in the affected area at no charge. Please check that your phone has this option enabled.

## Volcanic Activity

### Volcanic Alert Levels on Mount Fuji

- The Volcanic Alert Level is a number from one to five indicating the level of danger and necessary response for eruptions and other volcanic activity.
- Each level indicates the action that local residents and visitors should take (Level 5: evacuate, Level 4: prepare to evacuate, Level 3: do not approach the volcano, Level 2: do not approach the crater, Level 1: potential for increased activity).
- Volcanic Warnings and other notices are used to announce the current Volcanic Alert Level.
- Be sure to check for volcanic alerts before climbing.

Emergency Warning	Area from crater to residential areas	5 (Evacuate)
		4 (Prepare to evacuate)
Warning	From crater to periphery of residential areas	3 (Do not approach the volcano)
		2 (Do not approach the crater)
Forecast	Crater proper	1 (Potential for increased activity)

## Updates on Volcanic Activity

The Japan Meteorological Agency publishes updates on volcanic activity to keep relevant parties and the general public aware of such information, even if it does not warrant a change in Volcanic Alert Level. Please look at any bulletins that may be posted before climbing.

## Eruption Notice

Eruption Notice are put out by the Japan Meteorological Agency in the event of an eruption so that residents are able to take protective action as soon as possible. The issuance of such an alert, which will be transmitted to climbers' radios and portable electronic devices, means that there is an immediate need to protect one's safety. Please note that no warning will be sent for regularly-active volcanoes that erupt at their usual intensity or for eruptions that are not large enough to be immediately verified.
